The Great Pennsylvania Cleanup

For the second year, the Edgewood Garden Club, the Edgewood Foundation and the Borough of Edgewood are participating in the Great Pennsylvania Cleanup, a project of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection, and Keep America Beautiful.

And if you think getting six organizations to cooperate is tough, get this – for 2005, they are joined by the Nine Mile Run Watershed Association and Pennsylvania CleanWays of Allegheny County.

Edgewood's part of this project, which is held in conjunction with Earth Day celebrations, begins with coffee and doughnuts at Koenig Field House at 9 a.m. on April 23.

Volunteers will be divided into clean-up teams assigned to areas of the borough in need of picking up, sweeping up, and sprucing up.

Trash bags and safety vests have been provided by the state. Participants are asked to bring their own gloves and hats, drinking water, and sunscreen. The clean up will go on until noon, rain or shine.



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Newspaper Recycling

The borough is in the final stages of creating a new newspaper recycling program. This will differ from our current recycling program because there will be a drop-off site for our residents. You will be able to recycle newspapers, phone books, magazines, and junk mail. The drop off site will be at the borough building, next to the public works garage and should be up and running sometime near the end of April. Please watch the reader board in front of the borough building, as it will announce when the program begins.

Please remember that once the program is up and running, these items are not to go into your recycling cans. Residents can accumulate newspapers, magazines, junk mail, and phone books, but will need to bring them to the drop off site at the borough building.

This program is not only good for the environment, but will increase the tonnage of recycling material we collect. The borough receives an annual grant based on the amount of tons we collect. My hope is to be able to double the amount we receive with this new program. Please watch the reader board over the next several weeks.

Spring Safety Check-up

Although the snow is still flying as I write this, we must remember that this is now the time for the spring safety check-up. Soon the mowers will be mowing and the weed whackers will be whacking and this means the additional supply of flammable liquids around the house. If you do not have one, we recommend highly that you purchase an approved gas can to store your gasoline. Although the metal safety can is a bit more expensive, the investment could save replacing your house.

Never store gas or gas-powered equipment in your basement – remember, it's the fumes that burn, not the gas itself. Never store gasoline in a glass container. If by chance you have kerosene in a container never use it for gasoline. The combination of the two will produce an explosion similar to dynamite. Keep all of your flammable liquids in a well-ventilated area and of courses away from children.

Spring is in the air and there will be more people walking around the borough now that winter is gone. Please keep all bicycles, lawn mowers, and other personal property out of sight and locked up. Activity Report

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,267 calls for service in February. There were 446 incidents reported, 153 complaints received and 10 accidents investigated, of which one resulted in personal injury.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 26 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, 15 were shoplifting and six were other crimes.

There were 14 adult and 5 juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 26 traffic citations and five parking citations, and made two arrests for driving under the influence were made. There were four vandalism/criminal mischief complaints and three narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 17 false alarm calls, took 247 reports, responded to 24 public nuisance complaints, wrote five non-traffic citations and responded to 15 calls for medical assistance.

This program for seven and eight year olds has been one of our most successful programs over the past three






years, I would like to welcome back second year coach Howard Rohan.

Edgewood Directory


The Edgewood Foundation is looking into the possibility of publishing the next edition of the Edgewood Directory. This must-have book has traditionally been published every three to four years since 1935.


