

Watershed Group Counts on Volunteers in Great Edgewood Tree Blitz

Approximately 35 volunteers, mostly Edgewoodians, recently dedicated an entire Saturday to helping the Nine Mile Run Watershed Association take inventory of street trees in the Borough of Edgewood.

Information gathered will be made available to the borough to take into consideration when making decisions about tree planting and maintenance.

The day started with bagels and training at the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf. Volunteers were taught to identify trees, measure their circumference, and judge the health of their wood and leaves. After lunch, sponsored in part by the Edgewood Foundation, volunteers were divided into teams and assigned territory. In one day, they counted trees on all the borough streets with the exception of several blocks in the Regent Square area.

"I was just amazed at the level of interest and attention to detail that you all showed. I hope you all are very proud of your efforts!" said Marijke Hecht, executive director of the Nine Mile Run Watershed Association.

Marijke also extended a big thanks to the tree experts who shared their knowledge throughout the day — Anne Cumming of the U.S. Forest Service, Mark Remcheck of Penn State Cooperative Extension, Mary Beth Steisslinger and Phil Gruszka of the Pittsburgh Parks Conservancy, and



Turkey Season Starts Soon






Fund Drive

Retirement


And, finally, after 36 years of service Truck 137, the ladder truck, has been retired. The annual ladder test revealed two of the three ladder sections have worn down to a point that the ladder could possibly snap in half with any weight on it.

The truck was purchased new in 1969 and was delivered to Edgewood via rail car. Unfortunately, to repair the ladder would cost would cost over



\$40,000. To purchase a new ladder truck would be in the neighborhood of one half to a million dollars, not to mention that they wouldn't fit into the garage due to height. At no time will the safety of the borough be in jeopardy without the ladder truck. Mutual aid ladder trucks from Swissvale and Forest Hills will be used.
