Wilderness Hiking



Located in the heart of the community, Edgewood Memorial Park serves as the setting for the bronze doughboy statue, monuments, trees and the Roll of Honor plaques dedicated to and in honor of the veterans of Edgewood families who gave their lives in service to the United States of America during World War I, World War II and the Korean and Viet Nam Wars.

The Edgewood Memorial Park garden/public space planting has been nominated for a Summer of 2006 evaluation by Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful (the official state affiliate of the Keep America Beautiful organization) and a Community Greening Award that recognizes gardening projects throughout the Commonwealth that enhance the community and that can be seen and enjoyed by the general public.

Preserve Edgewood



Click It or Ticket Program

Edgewood Police Department participated in Buckle Up Pennsylvania's Click It or Ticket Program from May 15 to June 5. During this time officers conducted seat belt checks on Maple Avenue and West Swissvale Avenue. The total number of vehicles checked for seatbelt usage was 2,994. Officers were also out on patrol enforcing the seatbelt law to motorists at various times of the day and night. During this enforcement time we conducted 40 traffic stops and issued 37 traffic citations. Twelve of these citations were for drivers or their passengers not wearing their seatbelt. As a result of enforcement's law commitment, Pennsylvania's seatbelt usage rate has reached an unprecedented high of 83.3 percent. This translates into dozens of lives saved and thousands of injuries prevented. (www.buckleuppa.org)

Bike Rodeo

Activity Report

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,803 calls for service in June. There were 446 incidents reported, 294 complaints received and 15 accidents investigated, of which one resulted in personal injury.

Part I crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 24 Part I crimes committed in the borough, one was robbery, 11 were shoplifting and 12 were other crimes.

There were 16 adult and 6 juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 119 traffic citations and 414 parking citations. There were no arrests made for driving under the influence. There were two vandalism/criminal mischief complaints and three narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 23 false alarm calls, took 208 miscellaneous reports, responded to 25 public nuisance complaints, wrote 7 non-traffic citations and responded to 18 calls for medical assistance.


As the fireworks conclude the day family, and friends are invited back Sunday to enjoy an additional day of fun, as the first annual two-day event continues.


Known among local runners as one of the toughest races in the area, the Edgewood 5K features a challenging hilly course, and often offers hot and humid weather to add to the challenge.
