

Commitment to Community

WPSD

As part of the school's ongoing strategic plan, WPSD convened the initial meeting of the Commitment to Community Committee on October 12. The purpose of the meeting was to begin a dialogue on the challenges and opportunities facing our neighborhood. Wilkinsburg Mayor John Thompson and Edgewood Mayor Jean Davin were among the 15 participants who began to discuss community revitalization efforts that affect WPSD and the two communities. Superintendent Don Rhoten characterized these efforts as a win-win situation for all parties. Also attending the meeting were representatives from the Three Rivers Center for Independent Living, Jane Holmes Residence, Senator Jay Costa's office, and WPSD board members. The group will meet again in November.

Children's Center Grand Opening

The sun was shining on September 29 for the grand opening of the new Children's Center. More than 100 people were in attendance, including parents, donors, vendors, alumni and friends.

The new Center can accommodate up to 35 children from three to six years of age. Each of the four classrooms is divided into learning centers and gives the teacher the flexibility to rearrange the space in order to meet the learning needs of each age group. 
There are tentative plans for late November or early December to have a speaker present a program on Braddock Road. When this is in place flyers be posted on the library bulletin board.

Public Safety Town Meeting

We look forward to seeing you at our annual town meeting on Friday, November 17 at The Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf Auditorium. The meeting starts at 7 p.m. with a discussion of the police department's accomplishments this past year, and leads into what we would like to accomplish in the future. There will be a question and answer session at the end of the meeting. Refreshments will also be provided. We hope that you can attend.

Non-emergency Phone Number

Our emergency services personnel that answer the phones at our station have still been receiving quite a few calls for police assistance on our nonemergency number of (412) 242-9994. The borough offices have also been receiving these calls on (412) 242-4824. The calls they have received have not been serious in nature, such as parking complaints, suspicious activity, or minor thefts.

However, if you require police assistance, even for things that are not serious in nature, vou must dial 911. If you call the non-emergency number, the personnel that answer the phone will typically instruct you to dial 911, anyway, since they do not dispatch the police. Our non-emergency line is reserved for things like parking call ins, questions about parking tickets, any type of follow up with an officer about a report that has already been taken, questions about obtaining a police report, and things of this nature. We just wanted to take a few minutes to clear up any confusion there may still be since our switch to County 911.

Resignation

We sadly announce the resignation of Officer Randall Olsen from the Edgewood Police Department. Officer Olsen has been employed with our bor-

ough for about a year, and is currently a full-time officer. He resigned in October to pursue another full-time job in a related field. We would like to thank Officer Olsen for his dedication throughout his employment. Best of luck to him in all his future endeavors.

Activity Report

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,519 calls for service in September 2006. There were 482 incidents reported, 236 complaints received and eight accidents investigated, one of which resulted in personal injury, and seven of which resulted in property damage.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 32 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, there was one robbery, one motor vehicle theft, one burglary, 16 shoplifting incidents and 11 other crimes.

There were 15 adult and no juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 64 traffic citations, 252 parking citations and made one arrest for driving under the influence was made. There were two vandalism/criminal mischief complaints and two narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 15 false alarm calls, took 181 reports, responded to 18 public nuisance complaints, wrote one non-traffic citation and responded to 16 calls for medical assistance.

Safety Tip

The end result is that you have carbon monoxide coming into your house and the odor of something burning. Place guards on your flue pipes and invest in the CO detectors.


Edgewood Citizen Honored

Sigma Xi, The Scientific Research Society, honored Doris D. Jones by presenting her with the first certificate of "Friend of the Society" at a reception held in their national headquarters in North Caroline this spring.

Doris started her chemistry career as a spectroscopic at Weirton Steel. After her marriage, she moved to the University of California at Berkeley, where she worked in the chemical department and was finally accepted on the Manhattan Project and in the radiation lab. She served as the first female in the Heal Physics Department.

The Joneses returned to West Virginia, where Doris worked at the coal research lab at WVU and continued her studies. When they moved to Pittsburgh, Doris worked in the Carnegie Tech chemistry department. She also set up a grant-funded isotope lab at West Penn Hospital and worked for Pittsburgh Coke and Chemical.

Doris is well known in the Edgewood community, where she has served as president of the Garden Club and the Historical Society. She is a Master Flower Show and Landscape Design Judge. She has been active in efforts to restore the Doughboy statue and Memorial Park, and is a recipient of the William D. Limpert Award for Community Service.
