

Junior Council Person Emily Bush Making First Steps to a Legal Career

In May, Council Member Heidi McDonald proposed a resolution to appoint a Junior Council Person to the Edgewood Borough Council. A few months later, Ms. McDonald and her colleagues on council were called upon to explain the highly specialized vocabulary of local government to Emily Bush, the high school student appointed to the Junior Council post.

"It must have been my first or second meeting with council," says Emily, who was sworn in in September. "We were talking about X ordinance, Y resolution and Z motion. I didn't know what the difference was. So Ms. McDonald asked Ms. Schaeffer to explain it to me. It turned into a pop quiz for the more experienced council members."

Not to worry: "They passed with flying colors and now I have a better understanding of all that vocabulary," Emily concludes. "All of council has helped me a lot, and if I ever have that confused look on my face, anyone on the council is willing to explain more."

Ms. McDonald's hope that the role would lead young people to become more involved in local government seems to be working. Emily, a 17-yearold junior at The Ellis School, is interested in history, law and government, and sees her position as a place to start towards those goals. She is just now starting her college search, and hopes to be able to incorporate Latin in her studies as well.

Emily believes her work on council will help prepare her for a legal career: "Although we are not in a courtroom, I get to experience the processes and learn the legal aspect behind everything we do." She also enjoys knowing what is going on in the community. "We get to deal with issues from paving the streets to the passing of ordinances," she says.

When she's not in council meetings or studying Ovid, Emily plays lacrosse, soccer and tennis. She also enjoys knitting and photography. She is the vice president of the Ellis Athletic Association, social committee chair of the Junior Classical League, and is involved in the Student Diversity Leaders. "I also do miscellaneous volunteer work outside of school," she says.

Emily is the daughter of John and Lisa Bush, and has three younger brothers, JJ, Chris and Patrick. Perhaps the family is a source of Junior Council Persons to come.



Residents are encouraged to see council members, both junior and senior, in action the first and third Monday of each month (except when the Monday is a holiday, when the meeting moves to Tuesday). Meetings are open to the public, and citizens are allowed to address council for five minutes at the beginning of each meeting.



Kurt Ferguson Featured Speaker

The results of our Community Day environmental survey have come in, and we were not surprised to discover that one of the chief concerns among Edgewood residents is recycling. In response to this, we invited Borough Manager Kurt Ferguson to speak to our group, and at the last meeting we learned about the recycling program here in Edgewood.

Kurt's main challenge as the borough manager is to improve the quality of service without drastically increasing spending, and this does not exclude the area of recycling. He shared some impressive information about borough recycling, both curbside and paper, that reflected what we believe - that Edgewood is an environmentally conscious community. The curbside recycling program has a high number of participants, and participation in the paper recycling has been steadily increasing as well. Some residents may not be aware that the borough is reimbursed financially for each ton of paper recycled, but it is true that our efforts in paper recycling translate into a bigger borough budget.

Increase Your Recycling Participation

Edgewood Environment would like to make Edgewood residents aware that if a household is in need of another



recycling bin, additional bins can be purchased for only \$10 from the borough. You may take all of your paper goods to the bins behind the borough building to be recycled (phone books, newspapers, magazines, junk mail, cardboard (corrugated and non-corrugated).

Inside the borough building, there is a collection box for used cell phones, and soon Edgewood Environment will place a drop-box for battery recycling as well. Thank you for commitment to recycling in Edgewood.



The Department received AAA's highest honor, the Platinum Award, for the various programs the Department sponsored through the course of the year. The Edgewood Police Department was one of only six winners across the state to be recognized for its dedication to traffic and pedestrian safety programs with the Platinum Award.

Activity Report

The Edgewood Police Department



responded to and handled 1,801 calls for service in October 2006. There were 526 incidents reported, 257complaints received and eight accidents investigated, one of which resulted in personal injury. The remaining seven resulted in property damage.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 27 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, none were robbery, none were motor vehicle theft, six were burglary, 15 were shoplifting and six were other crimes.

There were six adult and no juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 83 traffic citations, 125 parking citations and made no arrests for driving under the influence. There were four vandalism/ criminal mischief complaints and one narcotics offense.

Officers also responded to 18 false alarm calls, took 345 reports, responded to 16 public nuisance complaints, wrote no non-traffic citations and responded to 18 calls for medical assistance.


