Greer joins a long line of generous citizens who have received the Limpert Award because of their selfless dedication to the cause of improving life in the Borough of Edgewood.

WPSD has purchased seven properties on Walnut Street over the several years; the most recent acquisition is the 10-unit rental property at 1209 Walnut Street.





Caution: Holiday Ahead


Once again, the holiday season is quickly approaching, and we extend our wishes for a safe and memorable Thanksgiving to you and your family. With the anticipated increase in vehicle traffic on the roadways we encourage you to be patient and exercise caution while operating your vehicle. Please remind your guests who visit to park legally and not block driveways, intersections and not to park along yellow lines. This is not only being courteous to your neighbors, but ensures the safety of everyone.

Edgewood Avenue

Now that Edgewood Avenue has been paved, we will be aggressively monitoring the 25-mile-per-hour speed limit. There has been an increase in traffic on this roadway due to various detours relating to the Parkway East construction and the Briton Road overpass closing. Please slow down and drive carefully.

Maple Avenue

Just a reminder – there is very heavy traffic on Maple Avenue at the beginning of the school day and at dismissal. If you travel this roadway, please pay attention to the heavy pedestrian and vehicle traffic in this area. For safety's sake, officers are detailed at Linden Avenue and Maple Avenue every day during this time period.





When packages are scheduled for delivery to your home, please make sure the sender has your proper address. Remember to make arrangements for pick-up and drop off if you are not going to be home.

Activity Report

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,628 calls for service in October 2008. There were 526 incidents reported, 246 complaints received and 10 accidents investigated, of which two resulted in personal injury, and eight resulted in property damage.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 32 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, there were one motor vehicle theft, one burglary, and 11 other crimes.

There were 18 adult and no juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 119 traffic citations, 252 parking citations and made nine arrests for driving under the influence. There was one vandalism/criminal mischief complaint and no narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to nine false alarm calls, took 260 reports, responded to 26 public nuisance complaints, wrote two non-traffic citations and responded to 16 calls for medical assistance.

Tax Time

Borough Real Estate Tax

As a reminder, the Edgewood Borough Real Estate tax is due at penalty until December 15. After this date, the tax will be sent to PAMS as delinquent. There are still some residents who have not paid this tax yet. I will not send out reminders, so check your receipts to make sure it was paid. This tax statement went out in April.


