Third Citizens' Police Academy Draws to a Close

The Citizens' Police Academy Class of 2010 graduated on June 1. Twelve citizens of Edgewood learned the ins and outs of police work over the course of seven weekly sessions. The academy covered such topics as Verbal Judo (tactics of speaking to people), hostage negotiations, accident investigations, juvenile investigations and computer and financial crimes to name a few. Edgewood Police Officers Fred Livingston and Mike Crow, Sergeant Kaskie and Chief Robert Payne were among the instructors.

The academy also had guest instructors that ranged from Honorable Judge Anthony Mariani, Honorable Judge Kim B. Clark, Detective Godlewski of Carnegie Mellon, Dr. Bruce Dixon of the Allegheny County Health Department and Randi Brand of Lloyd Street. Many other detectives and officers from the Pennsylvania State Police and other area police departments shared their expertise with the students.

The twelve students left the Citizens' Academy with an in depth knowledge of police work. "They found out how it works, what we go through and how the system works," said Officer Fred Livingston. "They learned that we all feed off of one another. Edgewood needs Swissvale, Swissvale needs other neighboring boroughs and we all need the state police. A lot of people don't realize that Edgewood's department answers a lot of calls on the parkway to help the state. This year's program has been a huge success."





Activity Report

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,286 calls for service in May. There were 433 incidents reported, 119 complaints received and seven accidents investigated, one of which resulted in personal injury, and six resulted in property damage.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 17 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, there were zero for robbery,



advertising packages available. Call Niki Augustine at 412-371-1711 or email <u>niki.augustine@gmail.com</u> burglary and aggravated assault, one for motor vehicle theft, 12 for shoplifting, and four other crimes.

There were six adult and zero juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 60 traffic citations, 378 parking citations and made zero arrests for driving under the influence. There were one vandalism/criminal mischief complaint and two narcotics offenses. Officers also responded to 14 false alarm calls, took 55 reports, responded to zero public nuisance complaints, wrote three non-traffic citations and responded to 19 calls for medical assistance.



Community information can now be sent directly to you through a cell phone text message or email. The Edgewood Volunteer Fire Department has utilized a new communications service called Nixle which will send information like road closures, hazardous conditions and other relevant safety information to residents. The service is free for residents within a quarter mile radius of the fire station. If you sign up for the service, you can decide which local agencies you want to receive information from and how you want it delivered to you. There is no spam or hidden cost associated with the service. Standard text messaging rates apply.
