



EVFD



Police Report

DUI Checkpoint

On Saturday, March 19, 2011 Edgewood and Swissvale Police Departments conducted a DUI checkpoint in the 1600 block of South Braddock Avenue. The checkpoint was funded by the Allegheny County District Attorney's Office.

It began with a briefing and set up of cones and signs on South Braddock Avenue around 11 pm. It ended with the removing of signs and equipment, ending around 4:00 am. Drivers passing through the checkpoint were stopped and informed of the DUI checkpoint. Drivers were asked for their license, registration, and proof of insurance. If the officer communicating with the driver felt the driver was impaired, the officer then asked the driver to exit the vehicle. The driver was then escorted to the parking lot across from Applebee's, where there was a command post set up. Officers would then run the driver through a series of field sobriety tests to see if they were capable of safe

If the driver failed the sobriety tests, they were asked to submit to a blood draw from a phlebotomist who was on scene. In all, nine drivers were charged with driving under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance. One of those drivers was also charged with recklessly endangering another person for almost striking a police officer with their vehicle. One driver was arrested on an outstanding warrant. Three

citations were issued for disorderly conduct. One citation was issued for an open container violation. Eighteen drivers were cited for driving under suspension, one citation was issued for an inspection violation, and one driver was cited for operating an unregistered vehicle. Over 20 officers participated in the DUI checkpoint from both departments. Officers have always taken a zero tolerance when it comes to impaired driving. Approximately 600 vehicles passed through the checkpoint, an extraordinary amount of vehicles.







Rain Barrel Owners-You Rock!

With the help of the Pennsylvania of Environmental Department Protection's Growing Greener II Fund, The Richard King Mellon Foundation, and the Roy A. Hunt Foundation, NMRWA launched The Nine Mile Run Rain Barrel Initiative Phase II in the spring of 2007. Over the last 4 years, this initiative has successfully increased citizen awareness in our watershed about the regional issues of storm water runoff and sewage overflows, while giving residents a simple and cost effective way to help reduce their storm water footprint. NMRWA has installed more than 1400 rain barrels within the watershed with over 3.8 million gallons of storm water captured - that's a lot of water!


Unfortunately. NMRWA guarantee subsidized pricing within the watershed for rain barrels after June 30, 2011, the end of our grant period. This includes the free barrels for study area residences. If you or someone you know has been putting off getting a rain barrel, we urge you to call today and schedule an assessment. Please note - because each rain barrel installation requires a property assessment - we will only be taking orders for barrels through June 1, 2011.



Sarah Rinsma. Class of 2010. was selected as the "Swimmer of the Meet" for the Conference Four College Championships held in Charlotte, NC. The Johns Hopkins women's swim team captured its fourth Bluegrass Mountain Conference title and 11th overall in school history as the Blue Jays won the Championship with 796.5 points.
