Graduating Seniors Honored at Foundation Brunch

The 26th annual celebration for graduating seniors was hosted by the Edgewood Foundation at the Edgewood Club on Sunday, May 22nd. More than 70 guests attended the gathering including 14 students from the class of 2011.

Foundation president, Amy Andrews-Hooks greeted the group and told the graduating seniors that they had set the "bar extremely high" for future youths. She introduced Nancy Douglass who reinforced this sentiment by noting that "she is completely impressed by the level of accomplishment of the youths in our neighborhood." She said that her late husband, in whose name the Mel Douglass Fund was established, would be proud of the students who are making a positive difference in the world.

Dallas Frey, president of the Mel Douglass Fund, awarded the organization's 2011 scholarships to students who were selected by the Fund's board for exemplary volunteer service and leadership.

Benjamin Clifton won this year's four-year award for his extraordinary work with a range of causes during his summer breaks. Frey noted that, "It is an honor to have a young man like Ben earns the scholarship in the name of Mel Douglass, a man who provided exceptional leadership and service to many Edgewood organizations." The scholarship totals \$4,000. Claire Gleason, Hanna Brourman and Brian Horner were recognized with one-time scholarship awards of \$500 each.

Longtime Edgewood resident, and president of The Buhl Foundation, Fred Thieman, gave the keynote address and told the students that they are fortunate to be from a "centered" community that has sidewalks as connectors, tall trees that offer shade and people who treasure each other as family and friends. He encouraged the group to support the community throughout their lives so that it can continue to be the wonderful place they have enjoyed as the place where they "grew up."

Thieman also encouraged the students to consider a range of employment possibilities as they look at their futures. He noted that sometimes non-traditional experiences may contribute to their lives in a way more mainstream opportunities may not.



A special highlight of the gathering was a tribute to Lois Winslow for her 25 years of service to the Edgewood Foundation.

The event concluded with a special video, "Times of Our Lives", written and created by Edgewood residents Marty and Mary Reidell with vocals by Patrick Cooksey.

Council Notes

The Police Regionalization Study Edgewood Borough planned to participate in has been cancelled due to the lack of interest partnering municipalities. Despite this cancellation, the Edgewood Police Department is continuing to pursue the goals of improved services and cost containment by working with other local municipalities through the Council of Governments (COG). Council and the Police Chief will continue to update you on this important topic.

When it rains, they pour...

Edgewood's sewer system is a separated sewer system which means our raw sewage (water from toilets, tubs and drains) leaves our homes (via our laterals) to the sanitary sewer pipes in the street, to pipes with large diameter that travels under Nine Mile Run, connect to the City's pipes and eventually reach ALCOSAN for processing. Rainwater from downspouts goes to the street and down storm sewers through a separate system that goes to larger pipes leading to the rivers.

waterways occurs when either ground water infiltrates cracked or broken sanitary sewer pipes or when downspouts are illegally connected to our sanitary sewer lines, over-stressing our sewer system. As little as 1/10th of an inch of rainwater can cause sewage overflows into the same river from which our drinking water is drawn from.

Since 2000, Edgewood, along with Wilkinsburg, Swissvale, and the city of Pittsburgh, has been under the Nine Mile Run Consent Order from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). Out of our participation in the 3Rivers Wet Weather Demonstration Project, Edgewood received grant money for GIS (computer) mapping of our system. This allowed the Borough to develop a prototype of complete and reliable sewer mapping that could be integrated with other infrastructure systems.

Because of the region's pollution to the rivers through overflow, EPA Orders were administered to bring us into compliance with guidelines to correct deficiencies and prevent future problems. Because of our cooperation in this matter, the EPA Consent Orders came with no upfront penalties for past or current violations of the Clean Water




Sewage contamination of our region's Act. The Pa. DEP and the Allegheny County Health Department have administration oversight.

> What does this mean for Edgewood? In order to be in compliance and not incur substantial fines and penalties, we must continue to clean, repair, and replace our sewer system to minimize the wet weather flow. We also must analyze how much of our flow increases will be sent to ALCOSAN for processing during wet weather episodes.

How are we going to do this?

What about the cost?

Accidents

Unfortunately, auto accidents are a part of life. Accidents can occur anywhere, on your way to work, school, or just going to the store. You can protect yourself by wearing your seat belt, driving defensively, and knowing your 1. Vehicle registration. surroundings.

This article will help you better understand what to do if you are involved in an accident. It will also explain what a reportable accident is, as well as a non-reportable accident.

A non-reportable accident is an accident that has minor injuries, or no injuries and does not require an ambulance ride to the hospital. A nonreportable accident also means that all of the vehicles involved are able to be driven from the accident scene.

In most cases, police departments do not generate a report if the accident is non-reportable. If officers are requested, we will assist the driver's exchange information and verify that the information is correct and current.

If the police department's policy states that an accident report must be completed, you will be separated and asked what took place. Your statements will be noted in the report, as well as the other driver's response.

A reportable accident occurs when there are injuries that require an ambulance ride, or the vehicles must be towed from the scene.

A reportable accident will automatically require a lengthy police report. A state accident report must be completed that consists of eight pages and a diagram of the accident. Along with the state accident report, a second report must be completed that stays in the Edgewood Police computer system.

It should be noted that it is not up to the officer to determine fault in the accident. It is up to the insurance companies to determine fault and proceed accordingly. If there is an obvious violation, the police officer may cite the individual(s) on scene, or by

If you find yourself involved in an accident, the following information should be obtained.

- 2. Driver's license number. In Pennsylvania, this is located in the upper portion of your driver's license.
- 3. Insurance company's name and policy number.

Police Tip of the Month

Summer is upon us, and soon the school year will be concluded. The children will be out enjoying their time off and may not be paying attention to the motoring public. Please be extra cautious of children riding their bikes on the street and playing near roadways.

- 4. Phone number for the person driving the vehicle.
- 5. If you are involved in a hit-and-run accident, call 911 immediately. Advise the call taker of your location. Attempt to get the license plate number, make and model of the vehicle and the color of the vehicle. Also, advise the call taker what direction the vehicle went and where the vehicle was damaged. All of this information will be relayed to the police. They will help locate the person responsible for the accident.


The key to remember during an accident is to STAY CALM. Vehicles can be repaired or replaced. If the other party involved in the accident becomes confrontational, get into your vehicle and lock the doors and call 911.






Edgewood Symphony Celebrates Summer!



Edgewood (FPCE) has received a grant to assist in the restoration of the FPCE's exterior doors that are original to the building. Work is to be begin in June 2011 by Gregory Heisler, Interior Wood Restoration. The grant is a matching fund grant where FPCE matches the donated \$5,000.00 to restore the 13 original oak exterior doors. The historical past of this building began before 1891 when members of three communities: Swissvale, Wilkinsburg, and Edgewood (incorporated in December 1, 1888) worked together to have approved a "unique" building erected for a "community" to gather, share, and worship. An abbreviated history taken from a compilation of Historical Society documents, church records, and a published document called "The First Hundred Years". represents the early history as follows:

On December 1, 1891, Pittsburgh Presbytery, granted the Edgewood petition signed by 65 persons to build a church, where FPCE stands today, but then, everything looked guite different! Pending the erecting of the church, a small frame building on the "Keller" property was used for church services. Women of the congregation "undertook a heroic fundraising campaign in 1890 to increase funds for the building fund." The first church building was dedicated May 28, 1893. "In 1893 a beautiful little church was built and Mr. C. C. Mellor donated a handsome organ"

By approximately 1915-1916, "the community church," as it was known," had out grown its structure and plans were drawn up by architect Thomas Mannah to expand the original building to Swissvale Avenue making use of as much of the original structure as possible. Ground was broken April 9, 1917, and on July 22, the cornerstone of the current church was laid, complete with a time capsule filled with all sorts of founding documents! On November 17. 1918. "the beautiful commodious structure was dedicated."

This beautiful historic structure stands today next door to the Pittsburgh School for the Deaf, diagonally across from the heroic Edgewood Borough building, at 120 East Swissvale Ave., as a unique structure conceptualized and built by members of a community to ensure that the community had a place to gather and worship. Names such as Mellor, Davison, Blackmore, Grubbs, Gordon, Lloyd, Gibson, Baldwin, Bigger, Moore, Fisher, Cadman, Thorp, Taylor, Marlow, and many more came together to ensure its existence. Stop in and see what these wonderful individuals and groups gave to your community, a building recognized today for its historic significance.

Homes With History

145 West Swissvale Avenue was built shortly before 1903 by Charles C. Mellor and his wife. Laura for the purpose of an income producing property. The home was built in a Colonial Revival style that was widely used in Pittsburgh area beginning in the late 1890's. The home was sold shortly after to construction a newly married couple, Ellen Breeden Morrow and William A.

Morrow. Before the purchase of their home in 1904, Ellen declared herself a feme sole trader, a designation that meant that Morrow could hold title to real estate without sharing the title with her spouse, a very rare designation in Allegheny County at that time. Many women held the title to owner occupied

properties to shield the family home from any debt or other potential liability stemming from their spouse's business activities. As a femme sole trader, Ellen Morrow would hold full title to any real estate she acquired, rather than sharing with her husband.


