As of the end of July, the EVFD has answered a record breaking 275 calls for service in 2011. In the month of July alone we had 51 runs. At this pace we are destined to set an all time high for emergency response for the department.

Opportunities Abound

With this growth comes the need for help. Help to the department can come in many forms. The Quick Response Service (QRS) may interest you. The department responds to emergency medical calls to assist the EMS service by providing treatment until a medical unit arrives on scene. Training as a first responder or Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) is required to respond to these calls. The department will provide you with the training to accomplish certification as an EMT or first responder. Vehicle Rescue Technicians are also needed. Again, the department will assist you in getting this certification. Sixty percent of our call volume has been vehicle accident related. These two positions will allow you to assist without being involved in fire suppression. Additional help is needed in the business end of the department. Volunteers are needed to review legal documents for the department and assist with grant writing

School is in session!

The start of the school season gives parents a great opportunity to inform kids of a few common sense safety tips. The following are safety tips for school bus riders, walkers, and motorists.

School Bus:

Wait until the bus comes to a complete stop before boarding. Stay on the sidewalk or off to the side. Just because you see the bus, doesn't mean the driver sees you.

- Stay seated on the school bus. If your child's school bus has lap/shoulder belts, stress the importance of using them.
- Don't throw objects inside the bus or out the window of the school bus.
- Don't yell or scream at others, as this could unnecessarily distract the driver.
- Keep your hands, arms, head, and feet inside the bus at all times.

When exiting the bus, always cross at least 10 feet in front of the bus. Never cross behind the bus. Remind your child that other driver's may not see the school bus letting children off, and they should always look left, look to the right, and look left again before crossing the street to ensure that no other traffic is coming.



Pedestrian safety:

- Ensure that your child's walk to school is a safe route with school crossing guards at appropriate intersections.
- Teach children to recognize traffic control signals and markings. For example: an illuminated walk signal still means that you must look both ways before crossing the street. It does not automatically mean it is okay to cross.
- Stay on the sidewalk.
- Teach children that during bad weather or darkness, drivers may have a difficult time seeing them. Dress your kids in bright clothing, and be extra alert.

Be extra vigilant driving when there are children in the area. Do not allow yourself to be distracted by eating, drinking, talking on cell phones, texting, looking at GPS units or reading. If you have a novice teen driver in the family. teach them to concentrate on driving and require that none of these distractions are allowed. Teach by setting a good example.

When school buses display their amber lights, understand that the lights will soon be turning red, preparing to pick up children or let them off. The amber lights do not mean to speed up and try to pass before the red lights come on. The amber lights are to prepare driver's to stop. The penalty for passing a school bus in Pennsylvania is five points on your license, a mandatory 60 day driver's license suspension, and a hefty fine. Even this is miniscule verses the impact on your life if you accidentally strike

Be observant of school zones and remember that the speed limit through a school zone is 15 miles per hour, or slower if appropriate

These are just some of the safety tips pertinent to the start of the school year. Talk with your children about the importance of staying safe, whether they walk to school.

Run Watershed The Nine Mile (NMRWA) Association announces The Third State of the Watershed on Saturday, September 24th from 8:30am-3pm at United Cerebral Palsy's new location; UCP/ Class 1400 South Braddock Avenue, Pittsburgh, PA 15218. Every two years the Nine Mile Run Watershed Association (NMRWA) hosts their State of the Watershed.

This year will be NMRWA's Third State of the Watershed and will mark Nine Mile Run's ten year anniversary! The Third State of the Watershed will feature keynote speaker George Hawkins, Esq., General Manager of the

Authority (DC Water). Mr. Hawkins is a vibrant and exciting speaker with extensive experience in many environmental projects. Mr. Hawkins held senior positions with the United Environmental Protection States Agency (EPA), including Senior Assistant Regional Counsel and Special Assistant to the Regional Administrator. He served Vice President Gore on the National Performance Review, playing an integral role in streamlining and strengthening environmental protection programs at EPA and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. The Third State of the Watershed will begin with morning presentations and offer afternoon workshops on a variety of topics, including: native seed

collection, water quality sampling, fish and invertebrate sampling, a rain garden installation, and a bicycle tour of NMRWA's green initiatives. A continental breakfast and lunch will be provided. In 2006 a new Nine Mile Run was unveiled. Sponsored by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the City of Pittsburgh, a \$7.7 million, 3-year project restored 2.2 miles of stream. Designed to ameliorate years of neglect and degradation, the project reconfigured the stream channel to slow and oxygenate the water entering the stream. Wetlands and floodplains were created, native trees, perennials, forbs and grasses were planted to enhance and expand habitat. In November 2005, the Nine Mile Run Watershed Association formed a monitoring committee to evaluate the restoration of Nine Mile Run. The natural resource professionals and researchers on the NMRWA Monitoring Committee have contributed thousands of hours of expertise, working to develop a comprehensive analysis of the changes in the stream and riparian area.

Background

Monitoring the changes in the stream and the effects of the Nine Mile Run Watershed Association upper watershed programming are critical components of the NMRWA's mission to ensure the restoration and protection of the Nine Mile Run Watershed through citizen engagement, demonstration projects and advocacy. Since its incorporation in 2001, NMRWA has sought to improve the watershed by building partnerships within the watershed's municipalities and supporting and engaging resi-dents in the issues of storm water runoff.

The planets featured are Mars (Bringer of War), Venus (Bringer of Peace), Mercury (Winged Messenger), Jupiter (Bringer of Jollity), Saturn (Bringer of Old Age), Uranus (the Magician) and Neptune (the Mystic). Pluto had actually been discovered before Holst's death, but he chose not to include a movement for the new planet. Earth isn't included in astrological practice, so he didn't include it in the suite either. The concert begins at 7:30 pm and will be performed at the Katz Auditorium at the JCC Pittsburgh in Squirrel Hill.

This holiday tradition will be filled with "Carols from Around the Globe" and other traditional holiday favorites. 
