

Edgewood Borough: 2012 Financial Review

The 2012 Audit of Edgewood Borough finances was completed by the Maher Duessel Accounting firm and reviewed by Council. Please see the accompanying chart (page 3) for details and comparison to the 2011 and 2013 budgets.

The Borough ended 2012 with a balance of \$599,398. Revenues for the year were boosted by several factors, including collection of nearly 100% of budgeted property taxes. Edgewood also collected almost 42% more than budgeted in earned income taxes (EIT). The bump in EIT is partially due to an extra quarter of revenue (PAMs collection was behind one quarter, while Act 32 (enacted in 2012) requires taxes to be removed from each paycheck before it is disbursed) and the likelihood that the tax is now being paid by more residents. Other secondary income sources were generally favorable for the Borough.

Expenses within departments were generally at or slightly below expected levels, with the exception of Legal and Insurance (i.e., unemployment, worker's compensation and commercial policies) costs. Street Maintenance and Facility Maintenance came in under budget due to delays in projects that we expect to complete in 2013. Snow and Ice Removal was significantly under budget (we'll see that cost in 2013!) and the cost of our Recreation program continues to fall (while maintaining our programs) due to the support of our volunteers and assistance of Borough staff.

The surplus from 2012 will be used for Borough operations until tax revenue from 2013 accrues.

Plans for 2013 include replacing windows in the Borough building (a costly and difficult process) and considering options for a long-term street paving program.





Dogs in Edgewood

The summer months are a great time to take your pets out for a walk around the neighborhood! Edgewood residents are a dog-loving bunch, and owners can always be found on sidewalks with their terriers, labs, shepherds, dachshunds, and mutts.

While you and your dog are getting exercise this summer, please keep in mind Edgewood Borough Code and Pennsylvania State Law requirements for pets. Obeying these simple rules can help keep your pets safe and the community clean!

Pennsylvania's Dog Law (3 P.S. §459-551) requires that:

- 1. "Leash Law:" Dogs off their owner's property must be firmly secured by a collar and chain or other device, or under the reasonable control of one person.
- 2. Dogs must be up to date on rabies vaccinations.
- 3. All dogs must be licensed by their county treasurer on a yearly basis.
- 4. There are a host of regulations regarding "dangerous" dogs, including owner liability for medical costs inflicted by a dog, and detention or even death for dangerous animals.

Edgewood Borough Code sections (§84: 1-10) and (§147: 2) have further restrictions regarding dogs:

- 1. No person shall knowingly or negligently permit any dog in his ownership to commit any nuisance on Edgewood sidewalks, parks, streets, or stairways, or in public buildings. "Nuisance" includes when owners do not immediately clean up after their
- 2. Dogs are not allowed to be "at large" off their owner's property (i.e., they are required to be on a leash).
- 3. Dogs ARE allowed to be walked on all public streets and sidewalks.
- 4. It is unlawful for any person to keep a dog which by frequent howling, baying, or yelping shall disturb the peace of the neighborhood.
- 5. Dogs are not allowed either on a leash or off – at Koenig Field, Dickson Park or Memorial Park.

Violation of any of the above provisions, upon conviction before a District Justice, shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$600 plus costs of prosecution. If there is default on payment of the fine plus costs, the dog owner can be imprisoned for not more than 30 days.


Additional provisions under State Law require the humane treatment of pets, and impose fines of up to \$1000 and imprisonment for up to 2 years for maiming, disfiguring, torturing, disfiguring, or poisoning any dog or

Further restrictions are found against harassment or interference with service animals for the blind or otherwise disabled, and for police

Edgewood Council has Approved an Agreement of Sale for Parcel D with McDonald's USA

Site had remained vacant for over 23 years. The Agreement of Sale for the 7.4 acre lot, known as Parcel D. was approved by a unanimous vote of Council on April 1. The lot (located on Braddock Ave. beside the Edgewood Towne Centre development) was previously advertised for sale several years ago without success, and more recently in July of 2012.







In July 2012, a bid of \$500,000 from In her time away from the office, Dr. Cendeco, Inc. was accepted by Council. The deal later fell through. The lot was re-advertised in January 2013. Two bids were received and opened by Council on March 4: a bid of \$500,000 from Cendeco and a bid of \$600,000 from McDonald's USA. After legal review, the highest responsible bid, made by McDonald's USA, was accepted.

Parcel D was originally to be developed by Oxford Development as part of the Edgewood Towne Centre complex, but after plans to develop the site were scrapped, the property was deeded back to the Borough in 1993. The lot has remained unoccupied since that date due to recorded covenants with existing businesses.

Borough Council determined that the cost of maintaining and repairing the empty lot, insurance costs, and the loss of potential tax revenue presented an unnecessary financial liability to Borough taxpayers.

Parcel D is zoned for business.

Edgewood is a community with a strong recycling ethic. The Borough contracts with 2 different companies for recycling collection, and our businesses can contract with others.

- 1. AbiBow Recycling, LLC collects PAPER from the collection bins behind the municipal building at 2 Race Street, and also at the Western PA School for the Deaf. Large bins are available to drop off office paper, computer paper, newspaper, junk mail, and magazines. They do not accept any cardboard or plastic bags, so please remove your paper from cardboard boxes or plastic bags when dropping off. Telephone books are not accepted at these sites.
- 2. Waste Management is both our garbage collector and, every other week, our recycling collector. Please keep the garbage and the recycling separate. Recycling is placed into the blue trash cans with the recycling logo; these cans are available from the Borough Building for \$20 each.

Items which can be recycled in **Edgewood:**

1. PAPER:

All paper, including newspaper, junk mail, magazines, phone books, window envelopes, and paperback books. Please put in paper (not plastic) bags alongside the recycling can.

2. CARDBOARD:

Edgewood recycles both paperboard cardboard. corrugated "Paperboard" includes cereal boxes, tissue boxes, shoe boxes, and dry foods boxes. Corrugated cardboard has a fluted center layer of paper. Please collapse the boxes completely, then put them in paper bags alongside or underneath the recycling can, or tie with string.

Note: if there is food residue on the cardboard (e.g., pizza box), it is not recyclable.

3. GLASS:

Edgewood recycles both clear and colored glass bottles, which go into the recycling can. Edgewood does not recycle window glass, light bulbs, drinking glasses, or glass plates.

4. PLASTICS:

Edgewood recycles ALL plastics labeled as recyclable with the small recycling triangle, including Plastics #1 - #7. They are placed in the recycling can. This includes water and drink bottles, milk jugs, empty household cleaning bottles, and shampoo bottles. Note: Styrofoam is not recyclable. Nor are bags with food residue or bottles that once contained automotive oil.

5. ALUMINUM, TIN, and BI-METAL CANS:

Edgewood recycles all of these cans. Note: The only exception is paint cans, which are trash items when empty and dry. If the cans are partly full, they can be allowed to dry in the open then placed in the trash. If there is not time to allow them to dry, use an absorbent material like kitty litter to soak up all the paint. Place the open. dry paint cans in an open trash bag on top of garbage cans.

Edgewood Officers Respond to Edgewood Towne Centre **Shootings**

Edgewood police officers were at Edgewood Towne Centre when shots rang out on March 30. Officers Tomko and Markus immediately called for assistance as they attempted to locate the shooters and treat three wounded victims. Many neighboring police departments and Allegheny County police responded to assist.

On April 1, one suspect (identified from surveillance video) was arrested in Wilkinsburg, one in Turtle Creek, and another on the West End. All three men face gun and drug charges. Another suspect from North Braddock surrendered.






Newcomers 2013


Grant Awarded to Promote Science Education to Woodland Hills Teacher

The Spectroscopy Society of Pittsburgh generously awarded Woodland Hills teacher Joe DeGroot over \$2,695 to direct a Science Olympiad program for 4th and 5th grade students at Edgewood Elementary. The grant includes materials needed to set up and Brinton Road Clean Up June 8, 2013: run inquiry-based science events in an Olympic-style competition. Some of the events include "Beat the Calculator," where students test their math skills against the speed of a calculator, "Circuit Wizardry," in which students




race to complete an electrical circuit, and "Straw Towers," which involves the use of 40 straws in an attempt to build the tallest tower with the ability to stand for 10 seconds. Students will compete in these events, which are Standards-Aligned Science modules. They will also learn to exemplify teamwork and team-building along with demonstrating problem-solving skills throughout the contest. With the help of Edgewood Elementary School

This project began with the intent of having the Edgewood students learn American Sign Language, but with the help of the WPSD staff, their collaboration has become so much more. These students are not only learning how to communicate with deaf individuals, but they have gained wonderful friendships filled with memories that



will last a lifetime. Their students have learned to socialize and communicate with peers very different from themselves. Noah Marini, an Edgewood Elementary fourth grader, mentions, "I enjoy working with the kids at WPSD because I've learned how to sign things like the alphabet, my numbers, colors, how to greet others, and much more. I also discovered that each time our classes meet it becomes easier to communicate with them."



The students meet every three weeks at either Edgewood Elementary or the WPSD. The teachers have prepared lessons which include team building activities and literature based lessons. The WPSD teachers and students have taught the Edgewood students to sign letters of the alphabet, count from 1-10 in ASL, as well as a

variety of high frequency words. The classes will continue to meet throughout this school year. As a culminating activity, they are planning a performance in May.

Mrs. Seigfreid's fourth graders are very fortunate to be part of such a wonderful partnership with a fantastic group of people at WPSD.

Safety Check Don't ever ignore your CO detector alarms!

All homes and rental properties should be equipped with smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) detectors. But do you know what to do if the CO alarm goes off? Recently, the EVFD responded to a carbon monoxide alarm going off in a home in Edgewood. The residents came home from vacation and turned on their furnace. Hours later their alarm activated. Unsure what to do, they reset that alarm. They went back to sleep and the alarm activated again. Finally, they called "911," the EVFD arrived, and we began an investigation in the home. Almost immediately, our meters began picking up high levels of carbon monoxide. The levels were 200 parts per million, which can be fatal. The gas company was called, and they red-tagged the furnace until it was repaired. Neighbors took the family in until the furnace was repaired.

There are different types of CO detectors on the market, and you should know what to do when they activate. If you have any doubt, call

"911" and let us help you. There is no shame in calling us and you should not be embarrassed by the trucks sitting in front of your home.
