
2014 Budget Highlights

Street paving, new playground, and new business development planned for 2014.

- The 2014 General Fund Budget was approved by a unanimous vote of Council on December 16, 2013. The 2014
 Budget has revenues and expenses at \$2,940,595.00.
 The budget balances with \$83,866 carried over from a surplus in 2013.
- Borough staff attempted to estimate a revenue neutral (meaning no increase in property tax revenue from 2012) millage rate in 2013 after the County reassessments took effect, however, ongoing property appeals in 2013 lowered total Edgewood real estate values by over \$11 million, resulting in a \$64,000 deficit in revenue for 2013. The Edgewood Borough Property tax rate increased .25 millage points from 5.65 mils in 2013 to 5.90 mils in 2014 to correct for this shortfall.
- The sale of Parcel D to McDonald's USA (next to Edgewood Towne Centre) is pending in 2014; the sale, if completed, will bring in revenue for the Borough and ongoing real estate taxes. (This amount is not included in the current 2014 Budget.)
- On November 4, 2013, Borough Council unanimously voted to borrow \$1 million for road maintenance and paving that is expected to be completed in 2014. Look for more information on the website and in future newsletters. The Borough will make 10 annual payments (beginning in 2014) of approximately \$114,500 to finance this loan.
- The Borough procured two grants totaling \$109,000 from DCNR and Allegheny County for new playground equipment and relocation to dryer ground. The

Edgewood Foundation has contributed \$7,500 as well. Construction is expected to begin this spring.

- Windows in the historic Borough Building will also be replaced in 2014. This project has been researched for several years, and a reasonable price was bid this fall for the replacement. This will represent \$132,000 in the 2014 budget.
- A grant for \$20,000 for updating the borough's zoning ordinance has been secured from the County. The grant requires a match from the Borough. The project total is \$40,000.

Edgewood Borough requires a permit for all businesses to solicit door to door. If someone knocks at your door and tries to sell you a product, they MUST have proper identification and a Borough permit. If the person cannot show you a permit, close the door, call 911 and ask the police to check on that person.

When a person or business applies for a permit, it enables the police to verify that the business is legitimate, and that the person(s) who will be soliciting are not wanted for crimes or possibly dangerous. Permits are only issued after these facts have been verified.

The borough has steps in place to help ensure the safety of our residents from bad businesses and/ or persons.

Edgewood Recycles


Let's make 2014 our most successful for recycling! Below are some basic tips and guidelines for our recycling program. Together we can make a difference!

In Edgewood, recycling is collected curbside every two weeks by Waste Management. If your household needs an additional recycling bin, they can be purchased at the Borough Building, 2 Race Street, for \$20 each. These bins are needed for curbside collection. Please place glass bottles, aluminum cans, and plastics #1 through #7 in these bins. You can recycle tied newspapers and paperboard (cereal boxes, pasta boxes) in paper bags alongside the recycling bin. Please rinse food from the plastics that are recycled. Do not recycle paper and cardboard that has food residue on it: these items must go in the regular garbage.

Corrugated cardboard can also be recycled: break down all boxes and fold them flat. Place them alongside or underneath the recycling bin.

Unacceptable items for recycling: carbon paper, food wrappers, used paper plates or paper towels, tissues, and styrofoam cups. Place these items in the regular garbage.

If you have a large amount of paper or magazines you'd like to recycle, you can place them in the large recycling dumpsters behind the Borough Building.



He married his high school sweetheart, raised two wonderful children, and established a successful career in business. Mel actively volunteered in multiple community service roles in Edgewood, ranging from volunteer fireman to Little League coach to church deacon, before he passed in an airplane accident in 1994. These facts only hint at Mel's true legacy, which is the wide circle of lives he enriched with his larger-than-life personality, unquenchable spirit, and deep commitment to serving others.

Mel's friends have awarded these scholarships every year since 2008 to sustain Mel's legacy and his love for Edgewood. The scholarships are awarded to high school seniors living in Edgewood for outstanding community service achievements. Our first two groups of winners have graduated from college and have launched careers. The first two Mel Douglass Scholarship winners, Andi Thieman in 2008 and Anne Hazlett in 2009, both continued to demonstrate their commitment to community service during college and are now engaged in careers that build on that commitment. Six Mel Douglass Scholarships and 24 honorable mention scholarships have been awarded to date.

The 2014 scholarships will be announced and presented in May at the annual Edgewood Foundation Senior Brunch. All college-bound seniors liv-

Edgewood Newcomers' Reception



Girls Night Out

The Woodland Hills Certified School Nurses partnered with Dr. Elizabeth Miller, Chief of Adolescent Medicine at Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh and Dr. Miller's third year medical student Nancy Fang, at the University of Pittsburgh Medical School (who was awarded a Pittsburgh Schweitzer Fellowship Grant.) Nancy's project through the grant titled, "Pittsburgh Growing Healthy" supported our Girls Night Out endeavor. Approximately 200 parents, children, teachers, administrators and nurses attended the event at Dickson Elementary School on Tuesday night.

Adults and students began the evening in the cafeteria where a pizza dinner was served. Nancy and Dr. Miller spoke to the group about living a healthy lifestyle and healthy relationships. The girls were then excused to the gym to go on a scavenger hunt as they visited informational tables. Parents remained in the cafeteria to hear a presentation on the dangers and prevention of meningococcal meningitis from Mr. Bob Werner, a

parent who lost a child to this preventable disease. A parent engagement session with Dr. Miller completed the adult part of the evening.

Each girl received a large bag with a wristlet and a small cosmetic bag filled with personal care items inside. The scavenger hunt consisted of the girls visiting each of ten tables and finding the answer to questions listed on a scorecard. Any student with seven out of ten correct answers became eligible to enter a raffle for one of 13 gift baskets. Table topics included Living Well, Nutrition, Dental Health, Exercise and Adolescent Health, Expect Respect (healthy relationships) and Hair Care.

BOY SCOUTS

The scouts would like to thank everyone who came out and purchased a tree at our annual Christmas Tree Sale this past December. The scouts use the money raised from the Christmas Tree Sale to fund their many activities.

For example, in January the scouts attended the Laurel Highlands Council's Klondike Derby. 

The 2014 Edgewood Borough Real Estate tax will be sent out April 1. The millage this year will be 5.90, which is up slightly from last year. This tax is due at discount from April 1 until May 31.

The 2013 Woodland Hill School tax is due at penalty unless you are paying in installments. The third installment is due by February 28, 2014. Please remember if you forgot to pay your second installment, you must add an additional 10% to that installment. I will accept tax payments until the end of March, then the bills will be turned over to the delinquent tax collector.

My office will be open Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday, from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m., beginning April 1. If you have changed mortgage companies or have changed your mailing address, please call my office at 412-731-0200. You as a homeowner are responsible for making sure the tax office has this information.


