


First Child Designs Weaving studio


r f you haven't taken notice already, our little neighborhood is filled with residents who have a diverse array of talents and interests. It's always exciting when that can be shared with the community. We're hoping with this Spotlight issue to share the weaving talents of resident Rebecca Hebert. Ms. Hebert has set up a private weaving studio at 117 Edgewood Ave (just next door to another resident artist). When Ms. Hebert retired from a fundraising in 2017, she decided to take up weaving, learning processes at weaving schools throughout North America as well as in Sweden and Mexico. Eventually her passion outgrew her home space and this studio has allowed her love of weaving to keep growing.

The main floor of the studio houses all of the looms and some of the yarn. The lower level is used to store supplies. Ms. Hebert's collection of looms ranges from the small inkle loom used for weaving traditional bands to a 40" Swedish loom and a 50", 16 shaft Macomber loom custom made in Maine. "A small drawloom rounds out the family." Most of the pieces, which include blankets, shawls and scarves, table accessories and pillowcases, incorporate natural fibers like wool, cotton, linen and silk. "I'm learning embroidery and spinning that I will incorporate into my designs."

Although the workshop is not open to the public and Ms. Hebert does not regularly sell her work, she does take on limited commissions. In exchange for an item, a contribution to the local library or to Pittsburgh Arts and lectures would be requested. Even if you aren't looking to make a purchase, it is worth the quick stroll on Edgewood Ave to stop and admire the latest work in the window. When she isn't busy in the studio, Ms. Hebert does teach some beginning weaving through the Pittsburgh Center for the

Arts and Media in Shadyside, and takes on the occasional intermediate student.

Seeking Applicants for 2025 Mel Douglass Scholarships

Edgewood's own Mel Douglass Scholarships, that recognize our high school seniors for outstanding volunteer service, will be awarded again this spring. Two Mel Douglass Scholarships, each worth \$10,000, are available. In addition, a number of \$1,500 honorable mention scholarships are available. This unique program, available only to Edgewood residents, has become a tradition that helps make our Borough a special place.

The mission of this scholarship program is to benefit Edgewood students while honoring the considerable legacy of Mel Douglass. Mel grew up here, graduated from Edgewood High School in 1970 and the University of Pittsburgh. He married his high school sweetheart, raised two wonderful children, and established a successful career in business. Before Mel passed in a 1994 airplane accident, he served Edgewood in multiple leadership roles ranging from volunteer fireman to Little League coach to church deacon. Mel will always be remembered for the wide circle of lives he enriched with his larger-than-life personality, his unquenchable spirit, and his deep commitment to community service.

The Mel Douglass Fund, started by a group of Mel's Edgewood High School friends, has awarded scholarships annually since 2008. During our 17-year history, 101 Edgewood students have earned 20 Mel Douglass Scholarships and 81 honorable mention scholarships. Most of these recipients have graduated from college, are leading rewarding lives, and continuing to serve others.

The scholarships are presented each spring at the Edgewood Foundation's Senior Brunch. All college-bound seniors living in Edgewood are eligible and encouraged to apply. Historically, more than 75% of all applicants have been awarded scholarships. 

Woodland Hills School District

Woodland Hills qualifies two elementary robotics teams, two middle school robotics teams for state competition

Woodland Hills will send two elementary school teams and two middle school teams to the VEX IQ Robotics Competition Western Pennsylvania State Championships in March. The elementary team "IQ Pandas" earned the Excellence Award at the final regular season competition, which was held at Woodland Hills High School on February 21. The Excellence Award is the top award given at any VIQRC event and it automatically qualified the team for the state championships. The team features students Julian Ault, Emmett Brubaker, Tate Norman, and Parker Yatsko-Shurr.



They will join fellow elementary team "Robotic Turtles" for the state competition on March 4. That team features students Alex Estep, Emma Gensure, Spencer Morse, Kyra Scott, Stella Wheaton, and Piper Yoder. Middle school team "Hardwired" qualified for the championships earlier this year. Students on that team include Kamran Carreiro, Rayhan Carreiro, Jonas Divelbiss, Wasim Matiq, and Sam Pittler. On Monday, February 24, middle school team "Pretty Pink Princesses" learned that it had qualified, as well. That team features students Colette Ciocco, Bella Colagouri, Adalyn Matthews, and Katelyn Pittler.

In the classroom, third graders at Edgewood have been using their VEX Robotics kits to forge new friendships with their neighbors at the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf. Mrs. Rochelle Siegfried's class are helping teach their peers how to make creative builds inspired by the book "The Chocolate Touch." Students have been making the visit once a month and will continue to collaborate throughout the spring.

Woodland Hills School District Board of Directors approves new contract between district and Woodland Hills Education Association

The Woodland Hills School District Board of Directors voted to approve a new Collective Bargaining Agreement between the school district and the Woodland Hills Education Association during its February legislative meeting on Wednesday, February 19, 2025.

The board approved the contract via unanimous vote. The passage of the motion led to a standing ovation from the dozens of district educators in attendance for the meeting, as well as from the board members.

"On behalf of the Woodland Hills School Board and myself, I am delighted to extend my heartfelt congratulations to each of you for successful approval of the contract! This achievement is a testament to your hard work, dedication, and unwavering commitment to both your profession and your students," said Ms. Terri Lawson, president of the Woodland Hills School District Board of Directors. "Your efforts have truly paid off, and it's inspiring to see the passion you bring to the classroom reflected in this accomplishment. I know this new milestone will open even more doors for growth and success. Wishing you all the very best as you continue to make a profound impact in the lives of those you teach each and every day."

"I want to express my sincere gratitude to the Board members, the administration, and our former superintendent, Dr. Daniel Castagna, who began working with the teachers on early negotiations at the start of the school year," added Mr. Brad Zolnak, president of the Woodland Hills Education Association. "It's easy to identify problems, but much harder to find impactful solutions. This agreement addresses multiple concerns raised by our membership and will provide long-term stability for both WHEA and the district."

Student leaders make final preparations for sixth annual Woodland Hills Student Summit

Student leaders from multiple school districts throughout Western Pennsylvania gathered at the Heinz History Center on Wednesday, February 12 to make the final preparations for the sixth annual Woodland Hills Student Summit. The multi-district event will take place on March 14 at Penn State Greater Allegheny.

Leadership workshops like the one held at the Heinz History Center are critical components in the preparation process, as they provide students an opportunity to work in-person with their fellow leaders from other schools. In March, the student leaders will host discussion groups with approximately 250 students from nearly two dozen school districts. The topics are hand-picked by the students and feature subjects mental health, social media influence, human rights, creating positive change in schools, trauma and informed care, the evolution of AI, and more.

As they worked in their discussion groups, the students scattered throughout the museum, where powerful examples of

leadership, empowerment, and innovation could be found in the exhibits that celebrated the impact of regional, national, and global icons. The Woodland Hills Student Summit was founded by English teacher Ms. Erin Wall six years ago in the wake of several tragic events in the district community. 
