From The Manager's Desk

Selling your home? Here's your checklist:

Anyone selling property in Edgewood must complete a few simple tasks to facilitate the sale. Sellers are required to conduct a dye test to make sure their downspouts and sump pumps are not connected to the sanitary sewer system. Any plumber licensed by the Allegheny County Health Department can perform this test, you do not have to use one recommended by a real estate agent and the borough does not stipulate which company does the testing. The certification form is available on the borough's website under the Administration tab. Your plumber must complete the form and return it to the borough along with the \$40 processing fee.

The next required item is a municipal lien letter. This letter is generated by the borough and certifies that there are no outstanding municipal claims or liens against the property for unpaid items like trash or sewage. This item is usually requested by the closing company once a property is under contract. There is a \$45 fee for this service and that is typically paid for by the closing company. A sale cannot be finalized without a lien letter.

The last item required to close is a certificate of occupancy. Upon request by either the seller or the closing company, the borough will conduct an occupancy inspection during which time the inspector checks to see that the property has the required number of functioning smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, that there are GFCI outlets installed near areas of water, and that other general health and safety items are functioning properly.

An occupancy inspection is not a home inspection. It merely ensures that property meets all requirements under the building code to occupy overnight. Residential occupancy inspections cost \$50 and that includes one follow-up reinspection. It is strongly recommended that you schedule an occupancy inspection as soon as you accept the buyers offer to avoid any closing delays as can happen if the inspection uncovers a problem that requires hiring a contractor to correct.

The Certificate of Occupancy form is available on the borough's website under the Administration tab. The form and payment must be submitted to the borough before the inspection will be scheduled.

A note about residential rental properties:

Residential rental properties including bed and breakfasts and short term rentals (i.e. Air BnB's) are subject to occupancy inspections once every three years. Koenig Field Tennis / Pickleball Courts



Edgewood Center Retirement Residence A.M. Rodriguez and Associates Inc

esidents have surely noticed the construction happening at the far end of the Edgewood Towne Center. This is for an age-restricted apartment complex being constructed by A.M. Rodriguez Associates Inc., featuring 52 new housing units. We spoke with Victor Rodriguez, President of A.M. Rodriguez and Associates, to find out more about this new living opportunity in the neighborhood. "The Edgewood Center Retirement Residence is affordable senior housing built to a very high energy efficiency standard called Passive House. This standard not only saves the project money on the utility billshas a very low carbon footprint, but it also provides a building with very high air quality," said Mr. Rodriguez.

There is currently a growing need for housing as prices have increased significantly in recent years; and there is specifically a shortage of affordable housing for seniors. This complex has both affordable and market rate making the property open to occupancy by seniors of all incomes. In addition to satisfying this immediate housing need in the Edgewood/Swissvale area, the new construction helps even further by creating a greater availability of single-family homes. As seniors move out, those homes can then be recycled to younger families who can maintain and improve them.

The company was drawn to the Edgewood Towne Center based on the convenience of the amenities there. According to the founder of the company, Anthony Rodriguez, "there are opportunities all over the USA now at shopping centers that have too much parking. Due to e-commerce, many shopping malls don't need the excessive amount of parking provided with the original design from 30 to 40 years ago. This concept not only better utilizes the vacant parking lots, it locates seniors in close proximity to numerous amenities."


The new units are expected to be available in the first quarter of 2024, and Mr. (Victor) Rodriguez noted that they have already received over 75 inquiries for the 52 units.

Mr. Rodriguez added that "the Borough of Edgewood seems to have people who love their community and don't want to leave. We see housing of this type meeting those needs by allowing seniors to Age-In-Place and still be active in the community they love." We know that Edgewood is a great place to live, and we're very happy to have this opportunity for our senior residents to continue to be a part of our thriving little neighborhood.

We are happy to see Koenig Field continue to be a space that residents can use to maintain their physical and mental health. As the weather warms and field use increases we ask that all field visitors be respectful to one another and follow the field rules which are posted on the bulletin board on the field house.

Field Reservations

Groups or individuals engaged in an organized (i.e. leagues, social clubs, amateur associations, etc) sporting activity are required to apply for and receive a field use permit. Individuals or groups wanting dedicated tennis or pickleball court time are encouraged to reserve their desired space to ensure access. Establishing a field use permit system ensures that field space is available for both groups and individuals to maximize recreational opportunities while ensuring equity amongst all users.

Scheduling preference will be given to Edgewood residents and then to other leagues, groups, clubs and associations. All facilities are open to the public unless otherwise reserved for organized use. The public may use all other parts of Koenig Field at any time that are not reserved for organized play.





VEX Robotics competition

Third, fourth and fifth graders from Edgewood Elementary STEAM Academy, Turtle Creek STEAM Academy and Wilkins Elementary STEAM Academy faced off in a VEX Robotics competition on Friday, May 19 at the Woodland Hills School District central office. The representative teams earned the right to battle for bragging rights for their grade by winning a school-wide competition earlier in the month.
